
BUZZ by NIKI —review by Felicity C.

Nicole Zefanya, widely known as NIKI was born on January 24, 1999. She is an Indonesian singer and songwriter but is now based in the United States. At age 9, she received her first guitar and independently started to learn how to write and play music. She actually won a contest to perform as an opening for Taylor Swift's concert in Jakarta at 15. NIKI moved to Nashville in 2017 to study music in a university but eventually dropped out two semesters to sign in with an American record label, *88Rising*along with some famous artists like Joji and Keshi which are two of my favorite artists.

NIKI started writing songs for this album two years ago while having her tour for her album before BUZZ which is the album *'Nicole'*. Album Nicole is also my favorite album and NIKI said that BUZZ and Nicole are kind of connected. She said *"I have fondly nicknamed Buzz Nicole's older, wiser sister. Nicole walked so that Buzz could run. Nicole was a very diaristic window into my past and Buzz is very much rooted in my present."*

According to NIKI, Buzz was the first album that she made that didn't actually have a concrete vision in mind. She tends to see things as black and white and was raised to think that way, with her Indonesian upbringing. She said, "*So I think this album is about unlearning a lot of that stuff, taking*

what serves you from childhood and letting go of what doesn't, and embracing that things will feel messy very often. Buzz was her first real, true exercise in just writing and making art just to make art for herself versus to fulfill expectations. She found a lot of artistic healing through making this album. She said "It was the first time I really kind of put my head down and was like: *I'm going to make an album for myself in a way that I want and that feels authentic."*

features a blend of soft melodies and smooth touching vocals.

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
• Heirloom Pain - 5/5
